PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful. And kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And you will renew the face of the earth. Lord, by the light of the Holy Spirit you have taught the hearts of your faithful. In the same Spirit help us to relish what is right and always rejoice in your consolation. Come and remain in us, O Holy Spirit enlighten us to reflect, share and live God's Word in our daily encounter with You, O Lord. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen. Introduction: We receive (take) the gift of life from our gratuitous Father, and in Christ we gratefully thank our Giver of Life. In our life journey, we experience being broken, healed, and raised to life ever new. We share {give} God's gifts – our time, talent, and resources with others.

Take, Break, Give in Christ are movements that mark our lives as disciples of Hope. May our lives gradually become our daily acts of thanksgiving to our Trinitarian God. Blessing and praising the Divine Presence draws us into intimate communion with the Spirit in Christ and with one another.

Opening Hymn: Bread, Blessed and Broken (SYPG D.65)

Here are three stories about the lives of people who try to live the mission like Christ, to be disciples of hope: 1. Betty is a resident in the home for the aged. She walks very slowly with a hunch and a limp due to knee and back aches. As she walks, she often tries to raise her head a little upwards to greet people with a smile on her face. One day when asked how she copes with pain with a smile on her face, she answered in her own simple words: "Once we grow old we cannot avoid pain. But Christ suffers how many times more because He loves us. I just tell myself that I want to follow Christ. I go for mass and I try to be happy despite the pain. Isn't it better to smile than to scold people?"

2. Simon is a father of three daughters. His wife, Alice is a homemaker. One of the daughters is disabled who needs a lot of attention. Each day is a struggle for the couple. For Simon, besides working as a project supervisor, he also sees to the needs of the family after work.

He is often seen accompanying his daughters before they go to bed. He tells them stories, shares jokes with them and plays with them. Of course, there are times when he gets impatient and scolds his children. He tries to cut down social entertainments in order to spend more time with his disabled daughter.

Alice goes about her daily routine with a sense of responsibility. She tries to look after her daughters, especially the disabled one herself and leaves other household chores to the domestic help.

On Sundays, they are among the early few to be in church. Both Simon and Alice say that the Eucharist gives them the strength to hold the family together in the midst of challenges and difficulties.

3. Janice and Jerry are siblings. Janice works as a kindergarten teacher. She often reaches out to the parents of the children in her class and tries to improve parent-child relationship. She says that it is worth walking the extra mile as taught by Christ in order to help the young children in their growing years.

Jerry is a college student encouraged by his sister, he gets involved in many outreach programs organized by the parish. As he walks with people who are poor and suffering, he realizes that he can be a disciple of hope to the less fortunate. Now he gets his friends involved too. He says that reaching out helps him to experience Christ in the poor. So, he wishes to learn more about the scriptures now.

Buzz with the person next to you. Buzz a second time with another person

How are the different people in the stories 'taking', 'breaking' and 'giving' Christ to others? Based on your own experience, how is the Eucharist an important source of grace and strength in your own life?

Food for the Journey: (Jesus left us his mother to be our mother)

Church Document Evangelii Gaudium, The Joy of The Gospel, no. 285

On the cross, when Jesus endured in his own flesh the dramatic encounter of the sin of the world and God's mercy, he could feel at his feet the consoling presence of his mother and his friend.

At that crucial moment, before fully accomplishing the work which his Father had entrusted to him, Jesus said to Mary: "Woman, here is your son". Then he said to his beloved friend: "Here is your mother" (Jn 19:26-27).

These words of the dying Jesus are not chiefly the expression of his devotion and concern for his mother; rather, they are a revelatory formula which manifests the mystery of a special saving mission. Jesus left us his mother to be our mother.

Only after doing so did Jesus know that "all was now finished" (Jn 19:28). At the foot of the cross, at the supreme hour of the new creation, Christ led us to Mary. He brought us to her because he did not want us to journey without a mother, and our people read in this maternal image all the mysteries of the Gospel.

The Lord did not want to leave the Church without this icon of womanhood. Mary, who brought him into the world with great faith, also accompanies "the rest of her offspring, those who keep the commandments of God and bear testimony to Jesus" (Rev 12:17).

The close connection between Mary, the Church and each member of the faithful, based on the fact that each in his or her own way brings forth Christ, has been beautifully expressed by Blessed Isaac of Stella: "In the inspired Scriptures, what is said in a universal sense of the virgin mother, the Church, is understood in an individual sense of the Virgin Mary... In a way, every Christian is also believed to be a bride of God's word, a mother of Christ, his daughter and sister, at once virginal and fruitful... Christ dwelt for nine months in the tabernacle of Mary's womb. He dwells until the end of the ages in the tabernacle of the Church's faith. He will dwell forever in the knowledge and love of each faithful soul"
