

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WORLD DAY OF THE SICK 2021

February 11 is World Day of the Sick, an observation started by Pope John Paul II as a way for believers to offer prayers for those suffering from illnesses. The day coincides with the commemoration of Our Lady of Lourdes.

In his message for the 29th World Day of the Sick on February 11, Pope Francis urges a path of healing grounded in a trusting and interpersonal relationship between the sick and those who care for them. "A society is all the more human to the degree that it cares effectively for its most frail and suffering members, in a spirit of fraternal love."

Jesus asks us to "stop and listen, to establish a direct and personal relationship with others, to feel empathy and compassion, and to let their suffering become our own as we seek to serve them,"

"Such closeness is a precious balm that provides support and consolation to the sick in their suffering. As Christians we experience that closeness as a sign of the love of Jesus Christ, the Good Samaritan, who draws near with compassion to every man and woman wounded by sin"

ABOUT THE WORLD DAY OF THE SICK

Initiated in 1992 to encourage people to pray for those who suffer from illness and for their caregivers.

World Day of the Sick was first observed on February 11, 1993. This day is also the Catholic Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, which is a name is given to the Virgin Mary in honor of the apparitions that were said to have been seen in and around Lourdes, France, by a young girl called Bernadette Soubirous. The Church canonized Bernadette as a saint several years later.

World Day of the Sick has availed world wide observance every year since its inception.

REFLECTIONS

Jesus criticizes the hypocrisy of those who fail to practise what they preach. When our faith is reduced to empty words, unconcerned with the lives and needs of others, the creed we profess proves inconsistent with the life we lead. The danger is real. That is why Jesus uses strong language about the peril of falling into self-idolatry. He tells us: *"You have but one teacher and you are all brothers"*.

He calls out those who "preach but do not practise" which includes us, since none of us is immune to the grave evil of hypocrisy, which prevents us from flourishing as children of the one Father, called to live universal fraternity.

Before the needs of our brothers and sisters, Jesus asks us to respond in a way completely contrary to such hypocrisy. He asks us to stop and listen, to establish a direct and personal relationship with others, to feel empathy and compassion, and to let their suffering become our own as we seek to serve them (cf. *Lk* 10:30-35).

TAKE COMFORT ON HIS PROMISES

When lonely and fearful, remember His promise in Jeremiah 33:3—"Call to me and I will answer you; I will tell you great secrets of which you know nothing".

When trials and tribulations seem unsurmountable be assured of His promise to us in Joshua 1:9—" Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord, your God will be with you wherever you go."

GOD HAS A PLAN & REVEALS TO THOSE WHO TRUST IN HIM

In spite of challenges one faces, God still has a plan for to each one of us to help in the building of His kingdom as in Jeremiah 29:11—"*I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.*" Trust in His wisdom and plan for your life, even today, even in your circumstance, you are in a position to glorify His name.

The story of Job calls all to trust in the Lord humbly. Job's wife and friends do not accompany him in his misfortune; instead, they blame him and only aggravate his solitude and distress. Job feels forlorn and misunderstood. Yet for all his extreme frailty, he rejects hypocrisy and chooses the path of honesty towards God and others. He cries out to God so insistently that God finally answers him and allows him to glimpse a new horizon. He confirms that Job's suffering is not a punishment or a state of separation from God, much less as sign of God's indifference. Job's heart, wounded and healed, then makes this vibrant and touching confession to the Lord: "*I had heard of you by word of mouth, but now my eye has seen you*" (Job 42:5).

ST PAUL'S PRAYER FOR THE COLOSSIANS

Here are 4 things from St Paul's prayers on behalf of the Colossians in times of suffering:

1. **Pray with a focus on God**. "... asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God."

Challenge: Instead of only praying for God to remove your "thorn," pray that God will fill you with His wisdom and understanding, that you will grow in His likeness and that you will please the Lord and bear fruit for His Kingdom in the midst of your suffering. Boldly pray that regardless of your circumstances, you will be greatly satisfied in God.

2. **Pray with a focus on others**. "And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you."; "May you be strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy..."


Challenge: Instead of only praying for your own needs, intentionally choose to lift up those in your life who need to be strengthened by God's power so that they can endure and have patience with joy in their suffering (and then encourage them by letting them know that you are praying for them!). Being others-focused often gives us needed perspective and the opportunity to comfort others with the comfort we ourselves have received from God (2 Cor. 1:4).

3. **Pray with a focus on the gospel**. "Of this you have heard before in the word of the truth, the gospel, which has come to you, as indeed in the whole world it is bearing fruit and increasing—as it also does among you, since the day you heard it and understood the grace of God in truth..."

Challenge: As a Christ-follower in times of suffering, pray with confidence with your heart set on the truth of the gospel – remembering Christ's sacrifice and victory over death, the grace in which you now stand (Rom. 5:2), and the fact that your present sufferings do not compare with the glory that will be revealed to you (Rom. 8:18). What an opportunity for the world to see the hope of the gospel lived out through you!

4. **Pray with a focus on thanksgiving**. "We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you..."; "giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light."

Challenge: Count your blessings – audibly naming them back to the Father in your prayers – and watch your momentary afflictions fade away in the light of His glory and grace.



<u>Colossians 1</u> finds Paul under house arrest in Rome, writing to believers in the small city of Colosse. *Life was certainly far from perfect*. While Paul was awaiting trial in hopes of gaining his physical freedom, the Colossians were facing constant pressure from false teachers who were trying to shake the very foundation of their faith.

Along with these most current hardships, we also know that Paul is living with his perpetual thorn in his flesh (<u>2</u> <u>Cor. 12</u>), and that he has already suffered severely for the cause of Christ leading up to this time (you can read a humbling summary in <u>2</u> <u>Cor. 11</u>).

Though we each have a different story to tell, hardships often rise to the surface of our lives and land us at the feet of Jesus where we find ourselves begging for His intervention and grace.

Take heart that you have landed at the right place!!!!

But when we're tied up in the weight of our every day personal battles, we sometimes lose sight of the bigger picture of God's heart for the world.

Paul's exemplary prayers helps us to remained fixed on the heart of God even in the midst of extreme hardship.

FEAST OF MARY, OUR LADY OF LOURDES

On December 8, 1854, Pope Pius IX proclaimed the dogma of the Immaculate Conception in the apostolic constitution *Ineffabilis De-us*. A little more than three years later, on February 11, 1858, a young lady appeared to Bernadette Soubirous. This began a series of visions. During the apparition on March 25, the lady identified herself with the words: "I am the Immaculate Conception."

Bernadette was a sickly child of poor parents. Their practice of the Catholic faith was scarcely more than lukewarm. Bernadette could pray the Our Father, the Hail Mary and the Creed. She also knew the prayer of the Miraculous Medal: "O Mary conceived without sin."

During interrogations Bernadette gave an account of what she saw. It was "something white in the shape of a girl." She used the word *aquero*, a dialect term meaning "this thing." It was "a pretty young girl with a rosary over her arm." Her white robe was encircled by a blue girdle. She wore a white veil. There was a yellow rose on each foot. A rosary was in her hand. Bernadette was also impressed by the fact that the lady did not use the informal form of address (*tu*), but the polite form (*vous*). The humble virgin appeared to a humble girl and treated her with dignity.

Through that humble girl, Mary revitalized and continues to revitalize the faith of millions of people. People began to flock to Lourdes from other parts of France and from all over the world. In 1862 Church authorities confirmed the authenticity of the apparitions of Our Lady of Lourdes for the diocese. The Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes became worldwide in 1907.

In Closing Let Us Pray together...

Our Lady of Lourdes, heal the sick, convert sinners. Health of the sick, Help of the suffering, pray for us. Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse in thee. St. Bernadette, pray for us! Amen
